Todd W. Gutschow Visionary & Outstanding Leadership Award THOMAS DILLON, Ph.D.

Tom was born and raised in a suburb of New York City. His high school years included a big commitment to playing football. He attended Harvard College and joined the Marine Corps' Platoon Leader's Class during his freshman year. A serious football injury prevented him from receiving his officer's commission at graduation in 1966. Instead he enrolled at the University of Colorado where he was granted the University's first PhD in Chemical Physics in 1969. He began a 15 year career with the Federal government mostly in the management of scientists and engineers in the Washington DC area. He was the Deputy Director of a National Laboratory, NBS and served as a Presidential

Appointee under presidents Carter and Reagan responsible for civilian nuclear energy programs. In 1984 he moved to California to join General Atomics and in 1988 he began an 18 year career at Science Applications International Corporation where he led a Group responsible for some of the company's most advanced technology applications. A top priority was the innovative uses of technology to enhance learning environments in public schools. He was honored to serve along with his good friend Todd Gutschow as an early CFF Board Member and was Board Chair for 2 years. For more than 10 years he has been enjoying retirement with his wife Carol and spending as much time as possible with his children Dan and Kate, daughter-in-law Katie and grandchildren Stella and Lucas.



Innovative Educator of the Year Award GLEN WARREN

The Encinitas Union School District Director of Literacies, Outreach, and Libraries, in other words, he is the L.O.L. Director. He co-wrote the California Model School Library Standards and the California Career Technical Education (CTE) standards for the Information and Communication Technology (ICT) sector. He is also the Vice President of the California School Library Association. Glen is an Orange County Teachers of the Year, California Semi-finalist Teachers of the Year, and was recently recognized by the California Reading Association with its first ever Literacy Leaders Award and a recipient of the CUE Gold Disk Award for Technology Innovations in Education. Glen has helped

lead the way in revitalizing the role of school librarians in a digital age, and establishing the Encinitas Union full Distance (Love of) Learning school option for families called the Cloud Campus. Student Empowerment and Teachers efficacy must include LOVE (Learning Opportunities Valuing Everyone) The ultimate goal for his work is to revive and advance the LOVE of Learning.



College and Career Pathways Educator of the Year Award MATTHEW R. TESSIER, Ed.D.

Dr. Matthew Tessier has been serving the educational community for the past 20 years. He began his teaching career at Feaster – Edison Charter School in Chula Vista and taught 2nd, 3rd, and 5th grades. Matt worked as a National Mathematics Trainer for Edison Schools, leading math instruction for 20 schools in California, Texas, and Georgia. Matthew was the Director of Technology and Student Assessment in the National School District before returning to Chula Vista as the Executive Director of Technology and Instruction. Matthew now serves the Chula Vista Elementary School District as the Assistant Superintendent of Innovation and Instruction Service.

Eric Chagala (Ed.D. Educational Leadership) is the founding principal of the Vista Innovation & Design Academy (VIDA). Eric believes that all kids need a place to matter, that our actions say what we believe about children, and that schools have souls & those souls need to be nurtured. Eric's belief in Design Thinking for education is deeply rooted in his dissertation that focused on the critical resiliency of high achieving LatinX youth. This research solidified the knowledge (not just belief) that schools have the power to either defeat or to perpetuate the status-quo of a neighborhood.

Eric has spoken across North America in both workshops & Keynotes

about Personalized Learning, Design Thinking, and to talk about what it takes to build a true school culture that will be ripe for innovation. Eric serves in different capacities to keep challenged with 'boots on the ground' around the most pressing needs facing education today. Eric lives in San Diego with his wife, two daughters and their Golden Retriever.



Innovative Superintendent of the Year Award HOLLY MCCLURG, Ph.D.

Holly McClurg is the Superintendent of the Del Mar Union School District, a 5,000-student K-6 school district in northern San Diego County. With 31 years of education experience, Holly has served as a district office administrator, principal and teacher in California, Virginia, and Arizona. She joined the Del Mar Union School District in 2009 as the assistant superintendent of instructional services and has been the superintendent for nine years. Holly's research has focused on the principal's role in instruction. Her current work focuses on decades of educational institutionalized systems, structures, and beliefs that influence the school experience for every child. Holly

regularly presents on how to revolutionize the school experience to produce students who are engaged learners and active thinkers who create, innovate, and problem solve.

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2020 AVID HIGH TECH ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT SCHOLARSHIPS

Each year CFF awards **AVID High Tech Academic Achievement Scholarships** to inspirational San Diego County students of extraordinary achievement faced with personal challenges.

This scholarship program is a collaboration with the San Diego County AVID program. The program is underwritten by the USS Midway Museum, the Jack-in-the-Box Foundation, and The Stabb Family. Since 1999, CFF has distributed more than \$630,000 in High Tech Academic Achievement Scholarships to more than 300 deserving students who are pursuing STEM degrees.

Less than a third of the worthy applicants receive scholarships. CFF invites you to support students like these to pursue a university degree in math, science, engineering or technology.

Nhat Pham of Poway is a 2020 graduate of Poway High School. Nhat had a 4.20 weighted and a 4.98 unweighted GPA. He earned a score of 1550 out of 1600 on the SAT. Nhat will attend the University of California-San Diego and major in mathematics with the career goal of becoming a mathematician. Nhat participated in Mock Trial as an expert witness, was a member of the National Honor Society, and served as a student representative on Poway High School's school site council. He was the treasurer of the Poway Student Alumni Club. Nhat volunteered at the Ronald McDonald House of San Diego, the Poway High School Library, and for the school's AVID program. Phat was an AP Scholar with Honor, AVID Junior Student of the Year, and was an AVID Top STEM Scholar. Nhat was Poway High School's AVID Senior Standout.

Nhat shared, "I thought of giving up at many points during this journey because of my challenges as an immigrant, but I cannot give up on myself. I could not go back, but remembering the struggles reminds me to be who I am today: a successful student who is not fearful of any challenges that come my way."

Priscila was JV lacrosse captain, active in Quetzal Mama, and a member of the Graphic Arts Club. She was a volunteer for the Encuentros Leadership Foundation and an AVID Ambassador. Priscilla received an award from the National Hispanic Recognition Program, was an AP Scholar with Distinction, and received an award for Academic Excellence with Distinction. Priscila was her school's AVID Senior Standout.

Priscilla stated, "A daily goal I know I'll have beginning my first semester of college and through every day of my career is to continue expanding my knowledge about the way the body functions and reacts to invaders and overall continue learning about the sciences that will allow me to help not only those I love, but the loved ones of others."

She volunteered at the Tri-City Medical Center and was a volunteer tutor for Project Reach. Stephanie was on the AVID High Honor Roll and was named Lacrosse Offensive Most Valuable Player. Stephanie was an AVID Top STEM Scholar for El Camino High School.

Stephanie wrote, "I think it is too soon to know what I will do with the rest of my life; I've only been exposed to so much. There are so many topics I have not

learned about and I don't want to limit myself. I will focus on my education and learn more about myself to make that decision."



Masiti Ahmed of San Diego is a 2020 graduate of Crawford High School. She had a 4.10 weighted and a 3.90 unweighted GPA. She was president and founder of the Crawford Drone Club, president of the Robotics Club, president of Boost Club, and vice president of the Garden Club. Masiti was a recipient of a Girls Take Flight internship with the Elementary Institute of Science where she completed 140 hours of training and passed the pilot exam leading to her FAA certification as a drone pilot. Masiti volunteered as a math peer tutor at her school. Masiti received awards from the California Scholarship Federation, the Auroras Honors Society and was a Crawford High School AVID Top STEM Scholar.

Masiti wrote, "In spite of the trials and tribulations of becoming a commercial airline pilot, I will stop at nothing to get to where I want to be."





Scholarship Federation, Mu Alpha Theta Honors Society, and was an AVID Top STEM Scholar.



Blake wrote, "There are too many people in this world who feel like they don't have anyone who cares about them and it is my goal to do everything I can to change that fact."




JOE RINDONE MEMORIAL AWARD


Dennise shared, "I am more than a hard worker; I'm a proud Latina overcoming barriers and striving for a better future."

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
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


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
